

Director's Note

This Pulitzer Prize and Tony Award winning play encompasses the 1950's and a black family's efforts to put down roots in the slag-slippy hills of a middle urban industrial city: in *Fences*, August Wilson tells the story of four generations of Black Americans and how they have passed on a legacy of morals, mores, attitudes, and patterns through stories told with and without music.

About the Author

August Wilson (1945 -), born in Pittsburgh, PA, dropped out of school in the ninth grade after a teacher accused him of plagiarism because his work was considered too good for a black student. He continued his education independently through extensive reading in the local library and through neighborhood experiences. His plays often deal with the conflict between African Americans who accept main stream American culture and those who want to embrace their African heritage. Wilson won a Pulitzer Prize in 1987 for his play *Fences* (1985). In 1990, Wilson won a second Pulitzer Prize for *The Piano Lesson* (1987). Wilson's other major plays include *Ma Rainey's Black Bottom*, *Joe Turner's Come and Gone*, and *Seven Guitars*.
